



English and Drama Highlights: Exploring Dystopias, Cultural Identity, and Playbuilding

Greetings, students and parents! It's been an enriching period for our Secondary students in the realms of English and Drama, with captivating explorations and exciting performances.

In our Stage 5 English classes, students embarked on a thrilling journey through dystopian literature. With novels like "The Hunger Games," "Tomorrow When the War Began," "1984," and "The Handmaid's Tale" as our guides, we delved into worlds where societies grapple with oppression, surveillance, and control. Through lively discussions, we've unpacked how these dystopias serve as mirrors to our own reality, sparking insights into power dynamics, societal structures, and human resilience. Not only did we sharpen our analytical skills, but we also honed our grammar prowess to craft narratives that are both clear and captivating. Throughout the term, they have diligently explored the elements of drama, culminating in a performance for Stage 2 audiences. Drawing inspiration from children's theatre, nursery rhymes, and supernatural folklore, their piece offered a whimsical yet profound reflection on conflict resolution. A heartfelt thank you to all the teachers and parents who provided invaluable feedback during the developmental stages of the performance. Special appreciation goes to Miss Reinhold and Ms Suwabe for facilitating their classes' attendance, enriching the experience for both performers and audience alike.

As we continue to immerse ourselves in the worlds of literature and theatre, let's carry forward the lessons learned and the stories shared, enriching our understanding of ourselves and the world around us.

On Wednesday, we had 12 students attend the REROC Take Charge Youth Leadership Forum in Wagga Wagga. This program is designed to help students learn about the kinds of leaders they are through different activities, and by working together with other schools.

Throughout the day, the students completed 4 activities:

Session 1 - The Mindful Warrier

 This session had students sitting in a circle, getting in touch with their feelings. Anna Gannon also led students through a commitment activity, asking students to try and commit to something new that they have been putting off, like learning an instrument, or learning a language.

Session 2 – Business Start-Up Fundamentals

 This activity was a hit, as we learned how to start a business, what things we need for a business to work, and what are some of the tips and tricks we can do as young people to avoid getting into trouble, being scammed, and having legal troubles.

Session 3 – Voices Workshop

 Led by Judy Gollasch, we worked together to help find our inner voice and learn to sing in a choir setting. We followed this activity up later with a whole group performance in front of our teachers, leaders, and the organisers.

Session 4 - Defamation & Social Media

 Solicitor Georgia Briggs came across from Canberra to work with us on a session that talked about what is ok to do with social media, and how certain things with it can get you into a lot of trouble, even if you are under 18. We also learned about our rights, and what we can be held responsible and accountable for in terms of the law.

In addition to this, we also had guest speaker Jackson Bentley come along and talk about his career as a music video director and listened to his journey of starting up 2 businesses which have finally become successful! This session inspired us to follow our dreams, and realise that we all have the potential to achieve.

We all got a lot out of the day and are really appreciative of the opportunity to have attended the program.

Library Admin

Before the holidays we will be sending home titles of books that are shown as overdue from last year in our system. Younger students can see titles but not access books above their year groups suitability. Many primary students have enjoyed learning how to use the collection and borrow an audiobook.

11-12 30 books of your own choosing. Set texts can count. All books in a series can count. Maximum of 15 can be audiobooks. Maximum of 10 can be magazines.
