#### **Premier's Reading Challenge**

The Premier's Reading Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for enjoyment and enrichment in students and enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student – to read, to read more and to read more widely.

The challenge is now in its thirteenth year, involves over 300,000 students and more than 2100 government, nongovernment and home schools. The NSW Premier's Reading Challenge booklists open doors to a rich collection of children's literature representing a range of books including fiction, nonfiction, picture books, poetry and drama, and include a wide variety of Australian authors and allows students experience a range of exciting stories and explore issues that can challenge the way one thinks.
